

# **Download Beyond The Crossroads (Part Two)**

## **(Primary And Secondary)**

This is the second half of the article featured in Classroom no. 11 based on last year's Ofsted report on English. It continues the summary of ideas and opinions arising from four discussion groups at a conference of primary and secondary teachers from schools which Ofsted had judged to be good or outstanding in English. They had been brought together to consider barriers to success in English teaching within their own schools and also the strategies which had worked well. English at the crossroads<sup>1</sup> reviewed evidence from over two hundred primary and secondary subject inspections over a three year period from 2005 and 2008. Although the national press typically tended to emphasise negatives in the report (Ofsted orders schools to brush up their English teaching), it actually contained much that was complimentary about English in schools. Primary growth and secondary growth are the two types of mechanisms that plants use to increase the size. The primary growth occurs by the action of the apical meristem while the secondary growth occurs by the action of the cambium. The primary growth increases the length of the plant while the secondary growth increases the diameter of the plant.
